Conflicting Reports on Security: While JTF-H reported relative calm in PAP during the morning IA Concall, mounting USG reports show the security situation deteriorating. National Security Agency (NSA) reports looting turned violent in PAP on Saturday, when a mob of around 1,000 people fought for goods in a central commercial street. Men with stones, knives, ice-picks and hammers battled to grab t-shirts, bags, and other items. Also, Embassy PAP reports escapees from the National Prison are re-forming gangs and re-arming to start kidnappings and other activities. Gunfire was heard in some neighborhoods overnight. More National Police were out yesterday, but too few to maintain order. MINUSTAH MIL and UNPOL have been patrolling as well. Both DG of Police and MINUSTAH appear to be traumatized by their losses. Embassy PAP INL Officer: Command and Control is urgently needed to maintain order. (1210, 1/17, Embassy INL email)

Water Remains Key Concern: The GoH has identified safe drinking water as the most urgent need among affected populations. Significant capability to produce potable water exists in Haiti through several private sector companies according to the USAID DART. The JTF-H is distributing water at 9 locations around the city and OFDA has identified and additional 5 for use today. GoH and UN are planning on placing additional sites online today. The capacity to produce water is estimated to be at least 1 million gallons per day. (0900, 1/17, IA Concall/internal sources)

Shortage of Trucks and Fuel: The limiting factor for aid distribution is transport capacity. This fact, exacerbated by the airport's limited capacity to receive, warehouse, and dispatch relief supplies. The road to DR is reported as open with a travel time of 2hrs to PAP, but warehousing and truck transport capacity are major challenges. Trucks are available in the Dominican Republic, but drivers will not make the journey unless security is assured. U.S. Marine units are expected to greatly augment transport capacity with their arrival Tuesday, 19 January. Fuel reserves remain dangerously low, potentially impacting both transportation and communications. (0900, 1/17, IA Concall)

PAP Embassy Resupply: Embassy Santo Domingo started an overland convoy system delivering food, water, and fuel. Santo Domingo also provided some extra vehicles to help ferry AMCITs. Santo Domingo will be running regular convoys of food, water, and fuel to PaP. (1000, 1/17, internal email)
