Jack Lew to Replace Peter Orszag at the Office of Management and Budget

According to the Twitter accounts of various well-sourced journalists, President Obama will announce today that <u>he will nominate</u> Deputy Secretary of State for Management and Resources Jacob Lew—he prefers Jack, actually—to <u>replace Peter Orszag as the director of the Office of Management and Budget</u>, a job which Lew's already held under Bill Clinton. Last week, *The Washington Post*'s Al Kamen <u>suggested that Lew was a contender</u> for the position, but noted that there was "strong resistance from Madam Secretary," by which he presumably means Lew's current boss, Hillary Clinton, and not best-selling author Madeleine Albright.

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By most accounts, the New York City—born, Harvard-educated Lew is delightful. "He's a tough negotiator, but he's very nice to work with," said Representative C. W. Bill Young (R-FL) in a 1999 New York Times profile of Lew. Two days ago, The New Republic's Jonathan Cohn appraised Lew's reputation: "Colleagues, present and former, praise his smarts, work ethic, and selflessness. They say he's the kind of person who cares more about getting things done than getting credit for them, a quality the president is said to value very highly."
