Hope the trip is going well.

I am forwarding a copy of the most recent report from the Tunisia team. I do not plan to forward all these to you but wanted you to get a sense of how things are moving forward. Note that some of the activities are beginning to get positive media coverage which is one of the things we are looking for. I had a good meeting yesterday at Columbia Univ. School of Journalism to see if they would be interested in working with universities in Tunisia. Also asked them about the possibility of having their media law experts work with activists in Tunisia who are focused on ensuring media protections are embedded in the new constitution.

Jose Fernandez has identified an econ officer to go out to Tunisia in the next few weeks to jump start the economic development discussions, with a special focus on working with SMEs outside Tunis.

Finally, I met with Carol Giacomo at the Times yesterday to discuss with her all we have been doing over the past two years. She was especially interested in the Tunisia story so we will see if it goes anywhere.

Tunisia Democracy Support Surge Team Report # 3

American Corner Sfax: Tunis IO Khile and TDS Surge team member Ismail in Sfax on June 9th to visit possible alternative sites for the American Corner, including the originally proposed Space of Enlightenment site. Goal is to finalize proposed site for R and Ambassador's approval and move quickly to MOU signing and Ribbon Cutting.

MEDIA TRAINING

DVC June 8, with twice as many journalists (15) participating. Mina Al-Oraibi, Washington Bureau Chief for *Asharq Alawsat* newspaper, was a hit, engaging local journalists in a lively discussion on covering elections and political affairs. Mina emphasized the importance of establishing credibility as a professional journalist with both officials and local audiences, in order to secure exclusive interviews and convey meaningful information gathered to the public. Tunis Surge team producing short "hip" video on the training, set to music, for Facebook and Website and blast to Tunisian and regional social media influencers.

Next DVC (June 28), will feature a senior Slovakian journalist who will speak about his experiences covering democratic transitions and elections in Europe.

DVC on July 5 will feature Abderrahim Foukara, Washington Bureau Chief for Al-Jazeera. Tunisia Surge team looking into possible AJ coverage of this session, as well as another short "home-made" video for Facebook/Website and blast out to Tunisian and regional social media influencers.

Tunisia Surge Team - Good Press for Media Training

Journalist Fatma Zourrig from Tunisie Afrique Press (TAP) participated in the DVC and also conducted an interview with Tunisia Surge Team member **Ana Escroglma** on expanded USG outreach with Tunisian media. During the interview, Zourrig praised USG efforts, commenting that the DVC series is "a very smart, inexpensive, and speedy way to train and connect with journalists." **TAP published (June 7) a positive article on our outreach efforts, which was plucked up by Arabic daily newspaper *As-Sahafa*.**

-CAPJC Partnership: On June 3, Surge team met with the Centre African de Perfectionnement des Journalists et Communicateurs (CAPJC) to explore possible journalism training partnership. The center is a state of the art facility, however its Director is pre-regime. We were approached by the CAPJC's Training Coordinator, who seems eager to work with us to develop a program. Strategic Social is putting together a proposal for a broadcast journalist media training that NEA/PPD will consider funding and pitch to CAPJC as a first step.

mobileEnglish/mobileCivic

Suzanne Hall is clearing a proposal for mE/mC with Washington stake holders. Once cleared, a Letter of Intent and accompanying concept paper will move to Embassy Tunis for approval. Until then, no negotiations will take place with Tunisia. In parallel, we are determining ownership of the English language content produced and sustainability beyond the 90 day promotional period.

Fulbright Program - Moving Forward on a Robust Return to Tunisia

Specialists: ECA graciously agreed to contact the 4 universities who have requested Fulbright specialists to go over specifics on what the host institutions must provide, what they are looking for exactly via Fulbright specialists, and will help them fill out the on-line forms. Embassy Tunis will take over once forms are completed and ensure that host institutions are capable of fulfilling commitments specified in the forms. **Institutions are: Tunis Business School, Espirit Engineering School, Univ of Sfax, and IPSI (ECA: Jason**

Graduate-level Researcher: ECA found a researcher to send to Tunis this summer who will fulfill the goal of "testing the system" on improved Tunisian paperwork processing and hopefully re-open the pipeline for a regular stream of researchers. ECA is working with post to secure GOT approval of her research project.

Scholars: ECA has identified four Fulbright scholars who will be traveling to Tunisia for 2011-2012 academic year.
